Cor. 2:16, which, with the first two chapters, shows that the presence of the Holy Spirit within, more than makes up for all our infirmities and lack of wisdom, knowledge and power, in such a

The second dish served was I. Cor. 3:12, "Building." Here one new thought came home to me with great force. In his sermon on Sin in Believers, John Wesley says: "We allow that the state of a justified person is inexpressibly great and glorious. He is born again, "not of blood, nor of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God." He is a child of God, an heir of the Kingdom of Heaven. "The peace of God which passeth all understanding, keepeth his heart and mind in Christ Jesus." His very body is a "temple of the Holy Ghost," and a 'habitation of God through the Spirit."
