

for wrong doing, a perfect prophylactic against sinning. A vision of the Christ like Paul saw on the road as he neared Damascus? Not necessarily. It is like that spoken of by John in his gospel, "I will manifest myself to him," "We will take up our abode with him." This manifestation and abiding was spoken of as future, "At that day," when He, the Holy Spirit, should be given. For all forsook Christ and fled at the very time of His sorest need. They utterly failed to understand that "Christ must needs suffer and enter into His glory.

But "the anointing which ye have received of Him teacheth you all things. . . Ye shall abide in Him." This then is the remedy for sinning, namely the receiving of the Holy Ghost and the "abiding in Him." Just as Christ is the great and all sufficient Atonement for sin, so the only but adequate remedy for doing what one knows to be wrong is Pentecost and fellowship.
