The need of the old time effort and power of the supernatural religion was never so great as now, but we find leadership in the ministry denying the supernatural and practically sneering at any new birth. These are sad days to the lovers of experimental Christianity. Well, thank the Lord for what there is of the holiness movement, for we are indebted to it as our last hope for a genuine return of experimental heart holiness.—E. S. D. in Christian Witness.

These are days when God's people need to cry out against sin of every form not fearing the people, but fearing God. We are battling against a subtle foe—he is wise, he is cunning, he is deceitful. He has been on the job for these centuries. He plans to overthrow God's children. But if we keep looking to Jesus He will bring us through.

Those who deny the doctrine of depravity ought to read the daily papers and ponder the question: Why are these things so? Never was the carnal mind more asserting itself in spite of the culture, law, civilization of two thousand years. If there is no depravity of human nature how are we to account for what

is going on in these days. And the end is not yet unless there be a great revival soon.

Revivals and spasmodic efforts to reach large masses of the people at once and lead them to a definite decision for Christ will never be worn out as a means of forwording the kingdom of God in the hearts of men. They will never pass away for the simple reason that they are divine methods.

The duty of the Church is to promote a revival of full salvation and, if we are wise, we will not permit ourselves to be turned aside into secondary service for humanity.

He who is successful in soul-winning must be wise. He cannot afford to indulge cheap or questionable methods. He should shun unkindness; he should avoid mere human effort; he should despise a paltry sensationalism. Humble, fearless, love-impassioned, and empowered with the Spirit, he should give himself to the art of soul-saving.

KINDLE REVIVAL FIRES.

Do not wait for the evangelist to come along. Every pastor and every lay menber of the church should work for a real revival. This is what the church needs above all things. And this is what she may have if she will pay the price. It is within reach of every society. Oh, for agonizing prayer. The Lord is pleased to have His people in earnest for souls. So far as one can judge from what he hears and sees in some places, the having a revival does not seem to occupy a very prominent place in the church program.
