Fredericton, N. B., May 27.—Rev. J. J. Colter, formerly of this city, died at an early hour this morning at Brown's Flats. He was aged eighty-seven years and is survived by his widow and one brother, Hon. C. W. Colter, of St. Thomas, Ont. He spent his life in the ministry of the Methodist Church, retiring several years ago, and taking up his residence in Fredericton. Last autumn he and his wife went to Boston where they spent the winter, going to Brown's Flats about a fortnight ago.
