SINGLENESS OF HEART.

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The first purpose of entire sanctification is to save us from all mixtures. Oh, what extremes of greatness and littleness are to be found in some people! Pleasant at home, good to their own household, but rasping outside of it. Or, pleasant outside and short-tempered and selfish at home. The justified state is often a mixed state; there is the instability of the double-minded man.

The wholly sanctified experience is an unmixed state—that is just the difference. Entire sanctification sets us free from alloy; pride, unholy ambition, churliness, babyishness—all these are purged away, and we are saved from mixtures.

Singleness of heart involves three things:

- (1) Deliverance from being doubleminded.
- (2) Deliverance from being disagreeable.
- (3) Deliverance from being apathetic.

Deliverance from being disagreeable! What a priceless blessing! I know the Bible warns us against being simply "men-pleasers." We are not to please people in the sense of sacrificing the Gospel to do so, but in the gentleness of Christ. A holy heart will keep us uniformly pleasant in spirit. Oh, I do covet for all holiness people this persistent, steady pleasantness of temper, the kindly spirit of forbearance, not only with our kind of people, but with those who are crooked and perverse.

There is no special merit in being kind to kind people, but we all know there are some people who seem to take a delight in paining your tenderest feelings, and holy singleness of heart will keep us perpetually and genuinely pleasant with such. It will impart to us a sweetness which will make us like Jesus.

Beloved, there are heights in this blessed life of holiness which we have never occupied yet! "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus." "Let it, just let it." Oh, how glad the Lord is to find a few empty hearts which will just let Him come and fill them. "Out of the heart are the issues of life." Get this single-heartedness at all costs! A single heart produces a life which is all of a piece, a life in perpetual harmony with God and full of steady kindliness to others.—Rev. E. I. Pepper.

TOBACCO WASTE.

One of the effects of the war is the increased use of cigarettes. One of the most disgusting things the Red Cross did was to supply the boys so freely with this filthy thing as to encourage those who were not using it to begin its use. Many a boy who would not have thought of using the cigarette was so much encouraged by the example of others and the promptings that would naturally come through the Red Cross as to begin and come out of the war a slave to it. We quote from an exchange concerning the increase in tobacco consumption:

Aug. 28 — The American appetite for tobacco continues to turn in the direction of the cigarette, according to figures made public today by the internal revenue bureau, which disclosed that taxes were paid on 5,839,707,747 cigarettes during July, an increase over July of last year of almost six hundred millions.

"As for cigars, taxes were paid in July on 589,176,020 large and 52,341,000 small ones, the combined total being about 9,000,000 more than the number taxed in July, 1922."

HOW TO LIVE TODAY.
