A gloom was cast over the community when it learned of the death of one of its much respected young residents, Frederick Thompson, which occurred at his home at Mercer Settlement, on Feb. 6th. Although confined to the house for a few weeks no one thought his condition serious, until a few hours before the end came. Mr. Thompson was a man of genial disposition, who won the esteem of all who knew him. Brooks, of Waterville, and Agnes, wife of C. D. McKinney, Woodstock. He is also survived by his second wife, formerly Jennie Todd, of Fredericton, two step-sons, two brothers and thirteen grandchildren.

The funeral service was held on Sunday afternoon at the residence of his son, Howard, and was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Conron, assisted by Rev. L. J. Alley, of the Reformed Baptist Church. The body was taken to the family lot at Bloomfield and interred beside that of his first wife, his six sons acting as pallbearers. The floral offerings were many and beautiful.
