Dear Friends at Beulah:

We extend greetings from across the ocean, trusting that this letter will reach you at Alliance time though we fear it is really too late to expect it. We have been so busy with malaria patients the last five weeks, it has been impossible to settle down to letter writing. The last four took their leave yesterday and so we sieze our first opportunity to send this letter on its way to fair Beulah on the St. John.

We trust you will have a gracious Alliance and Camp Meeting and our prayers are with you. It is not hard to imagine ourselves there among familiar faces and scenes. Some of the long familiar faces will not be among your number this year, for they "have gone the last mile of the way." We know you will miss their presence greatly.

We have much to praise the Lord for. He has lovingly cared for us during the year and continued to encourage our hearts in Him. We can see progress in the knowledge of the Zulu people and language and our prayer is that the coming year will be one of greater progress. Personal work among the natives is our greatest opportunity. This siege of sickness has softened many hearts and some have turned to the Lord. One old man said in leaving, "The Lord has worked greatly in my heart and it is sweet to me." We hope to follow up the people by visiting the kraals. Our work on this line has been limited because we have no horses and the heat has been intense. Now our stable is about complete and we trust to get the horses this week ,and as the fever siege is over we can go out once again. Our little services at the Kraals have been blest of God and we leave results with Him; already He has given us tokens that our efforts have not been in vain, and we praise Him.

We praise the Lord that though in the midst of sickness these last two months He has kept us from fever for which we are so thankful and we give Him all the praise. Truly he is very very good to us, and we look forward to a good winter among the people.

We thank you all so much for your prayers and support. It means so much to us to know that daily prayer is offered for the word here and we know prayer changes things. I cannot close without thanking you once again for our home which is such an inexpressible comfort to these girls in this far off land. God bless you all, and reward you abundantly is our prayer. We are here in His will.
