EDITORIAL.

RIVERSIDE CAMP MEETING.

Our evangelist, Rev. J. L. Glascock, was early on hand ready for the battle and never once flinched in the fight. He was indeed a noble leader, well versed in all the attacks of the enemy and skilled, not only in repelling but in carrying the battle into the enemies' camp to a successful conclusion.
