EDITORIAL.

PRAYER.

O Lord, we pray for daily strengthening that we may live our lives as those who must give an account. Thou judgest all mankind. May we be aided by Thy grace to prove our own work, according to Thy Word. Then shall we have rejoicing in ourselves and not in another. Let the words of our mouth and the meditation of our heart be acceptable in Thy sight, O Lord, our strength and our Redeemer. For Jesus' sake. Amen.

"Blesed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ."—Eph. 1:13.

Heaven gave its richest blessing to the world when it gave us Jesus Christ, "for God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." It is a most wonderful and blessed experience to be regenerated, to be born from above, to receive Jesus Christ as our Saviour. It is one of the greatest, if not the greatest blessing the soul can receive. But, in receiving Christ we receive with Him not only a new heart, a new life, but sanctification also, as He "is made unto us wisdom, righteousness and sanctification and redemption." God in giving us his Son shall "with him also freely give us all things." Brother, have you entered into, claimed and taken possession of your inheritance?

Remember "all spiritual blessings in Christ." A pure heart filled with the Holy Ghost, a knowledge of the will of God and power to do it, the comfort and guidance of the Spirit, an increasing likeness to Christ, and all other "spiritual blessings" we have, as our inheritance in Christ. Open thine heart, receive Jesus, and you have the "heir of all things."

Every honest soul will always have light enough to discern its own spiritual needs. The wise men had the heavenly star. It led them to Jesus. And Jesus is the "True Light," and said, "I am come a Light into the world, that whosoever

believeth on Me should not abide in darkness." Are we honest? Are we honest enough to always follow the Light? It is a most blessed thing to be downright, upright and outright, and always right, and truly honest.

Everybody believes in a doctrine of Holiness, but everybody does not believe that the soul be made entirely holy instantaneously in this life. But Rev. John Wesley did. He says: "You may obtain a growing victory over sin from the moment you are justified. But this is not enough. The body of sin, the carnal mind, must be destroyed; the old man must be slain, or we cannot put on the new man, which is created after God (or which is the image of God) in righteousness and true holiness; and this is done in a moment. To talk of this work as being gradual, would be to talk nonsense, as much as if we talked of gradual justification."

Christian perfection is a state into which the soul cannot enter without crossing the line of entire consecration; and the crossing is instantaneous. Again Mr. Wesley says: "Christian perfection is that love to God and our neighbor, which implies deliverance from all sin. It is received merely by faith. It is given instantaneously. We are to expect it, not at death, but every moment; now is the accepted time; now is the day of this salvation."

Justification and regeneration affect our actual sins, and at the same time we receive power to keep under all vile affections, but this does not mean that original sin or carnality is destroyed. This is only accomplished when the soul is entirely sanctified. Mr. Wesley says, in speaking of justification: "That believers are delivered from the guilt and power of sin we allow; that they are delivered from the being of it we deny."—Wesley's Sermon, Vol. 1, p. 113. Again he says: "Only let it be remembered, the heart of a believer is not wholly purified when he is justified. Sin is overcome, but it is not rooted out; it is conquered, but it is not destroyed."—Sermon, Vol. 2, p. 478.

And notwithstanding all this, there are persons who profess to be followers of John Wesley, and also others who profess to believe as John Wesley believed, who deny that Christian Perfection is instantaneously received, and declare that the heart is made free from sin only by a gradual growth process.

But surely nothing becomes pure by growth. Growth is not a cleansing process. Nor is purification a growing process. Growing in grace is not growing into grace. Nor is growing in grace, growing out of sin. You cannot grow sin out. There is only one way to get rid of sin, and that is by the precious blood of Jesus Christ that "cleanseth from all sin." Believe it, receive it, and know for yourself, dear reader.
