Dear Highway:

The revival services were continued with unabating interest during the week following the 10th. The crowds were so large that we engaged the city hall from the 13th to the 17th inclusive. This was a stretch of faith as it cost us \$25 a day. God stood by us and although many other things were on, the people came, till on Sunday night, the 17th, the place was crowded. The closing service with Brother Good was a trying one for him, as he had received a telephone message informing him of the sudden death of his mother. Although bowed down with grief the Lord wonderfully upheld him and he preached with power on Heaven. The financial obligations were easily met. Twelve candidates were baptized at the close of the morning service, the 17th. I felt the services should be continued for another week, the crowd was not so large but the meetings were profitable and a number received help. Sunday, the 24th, was a grand day, the Sunday School was doubled in attendance and the church was crowded at the evening service, the ordinance of baptism was administered to 12 candidates. Several seekers were at the altar. We are trusting that the good work will go on. The Quarterly Meetings begin on the 6th of March. We ask the prayers of God's people that it may be a glorious season. Keep on praying.
