

#### EDITORIAL

#### THE RISEN LORD.

The return of the memorial of our risen Lord is hailed by many with gladness, as it is the dawn of springtime, not only in the natural but in the spiritual world.

The coming of the spring always brings joy, as the winter has passed, with its chill and dreary days, and the brightness and gladness of the springing flowers have come. How much more should our hearts be glad when the winter of moral gloom and coldness has passed and the sunshine and joy of salvation has come to us.

Many regard Easter as a time of vacation from toil, or of reunions, or of mirth, or the giving and receiving of gifts. In many churches Easter is the time for decoration and exhibition of musical talents, and one church may seek to rival another. How great the tendency to look upon the showy shadow and forget the substance, to regard the letter and forget the spirit. Emblems, symbols and types may hide or becloud the reality. But whose resurrection does Easter celebrate? Why did Christ arise? These are important questions. How many repeat words without feeling, especially scriptural terms. Thousands repeat the words, "All we like sheep have gone astray-and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all," and yet keep on going astray and not accepting the remedy for straying. So may many read, hear, speak, or sing of the risen Lord and yet their hearts and lives remain unaffected. It is not by joining in a public recognition of the risen Lord that we shall come to know the power of Christ's resurrection. Religious services that are not prompted by the Holy Spirit's indwelling are naught but a hollow show. Such services have no power to strengthen and comfort until we can say from the heart, My risen Lord! Only when Thomas ceased doubting could he say, My Lord and My God." To be able to truly say the above

we must submit ourselves to God and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, for "as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name."

Why did Jesus die? To accomplish the purpose for which He came into the world — "to destroy the works of the devil" to save the lost. He came to the world to teach, to exemplify, to suffer, to die, that He might show the way to the Father, and lead them to Him—to Heaven.

He rose from the dead to prove His power to do these things; to fulfil His own promise and prediction, and all that had been foretold of Him by Moses and the prophets. He rose to place beyond doubt the fact that life and immortality are sublime and indestructible truths life from God in the soul, and an immortality of conscious personality in communion with Christ.

Jesus rose and manifested himself, to prove that there is a continuity of life and individuality—that those whom God gives to His Son shall be forever with Him, and so be forever with each other. We may know this. We may be so conscious of this, that we will have no doubt in regard to it, and be able to say from the heart— "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

If Christ died to save men there must be a way that leads to the mount of vision. He said—"I am the way, the truth and the life." "I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved." Then there must no longer be a diffusion of thought, through a generality of saying— "Our risen Lord," or "The risen Lord," but each must cry for himself or herself— "God be merciful to **me** a sinner," until the pardoning voice of God is heard and we receive "the Spirit of adoption, whereby we cry, Abba Father." Then only can we say— **"My** risen Lord." Then the **heart** will sing
