Paul exhorted Timothy to follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, and be "not entangled again with the yoke of bondage." And a Christian who goes to such places has no good influence over sinners.

Again it is said a person ought to have enough religion to attend a fair and horse race—"It is no harm." When told of the evil it leads to one is met with the assertion, "Why, the churches hold fairs that are cheats, and they say, "It is no harm." The Lord help such church members to see in what direction their light is shining! Surely God does not approve of such work. There is great harm in it; it is a stumbling block to sinners. "All unrighteousness is sin" (I. John 5:17). "Awake to righteousness, and sin not." I. Cor. 15.34.

It is evil; thousands of men have been killed at gambling tables. Oh, may the Lord help card-playing church members to see the awful example they are setting to poor lost sinners! And to see their need of full salvation-One that will cleanse all such nonsense out of their hearts. "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." It is awful to think that persons professing to follow Jesus could not be distinguished from sinners, either in the church or out of it. They dress like sinners, act like sinners, and go with sinners, when God says we are to separate from them, and lift up a standard for the people. We can never do this by conforming to the way of the world.

We are to condemn sin in every way it comes up. When we are tempted to go to forbidden places, let us ask, "Is there any glory to God in it?" If not, shun it as one would a viper. For whether we eat or drink, it should be done to His glory.
