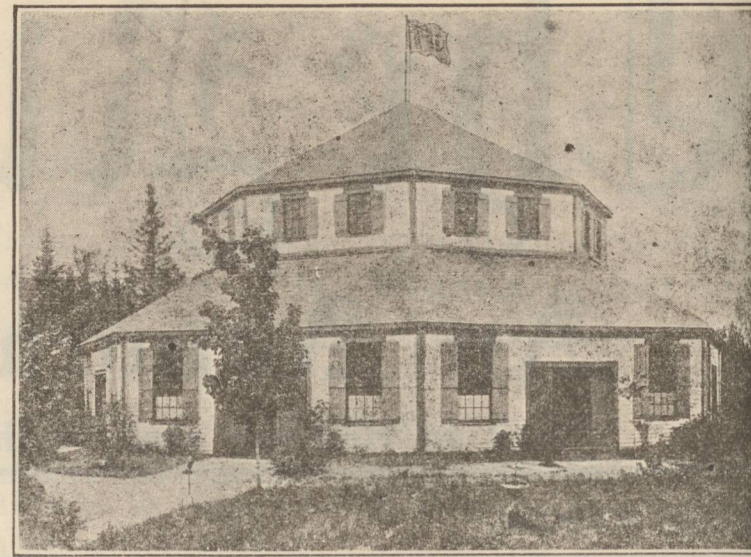
Dear Highway:
