Tobacco is a curse. We say this because it degrades manhood. It undermines and weakens character and leaves its poor helpless dupes slaves. It dulls the sense and robs the student of honor. We quote the following in this connection:

Dr. Dio Lewis at Harvard College says, "During fifty years, although five out of every six students used tobacco, not one of the users of tobacco ever graduated at the head of his class."

Navy, said: "Recently in Boston out of 600 applicants for the navy only thirty were accepted." "The young men who were rejected," says Dr. Kress, "were not regarded as infirm by their friends. They were volunteers who considered themselves in health, unconscious of any physical infirmity. They represent America's best." Out of 117,000 enrolled this last summer for the navy in eastern, southern, central and western section of the country only 29 per cent were found fit. Out of 160,000 enlisting in eleven months of 1914 and 1915 only 22 per cent. were found fit. There are abundant statistics similar to these, and in many cases cigarettes helped to make them unfit for service."

"Not only was it found that tobacco made the young manhood of America unfit to serve their country but it proved also to be a great hindrance to the sick and wounded. We give the following conclusive evidence from the report of a London military hospital superintendent:

"A patient returning to the hospital after a day's leave is often found with an irregular pulse, due to his smoking. This interferes with sleep and leads to a gen-

eral lowering of vitality. The public should remember that a convalescent soldier is more like a young boy than a grown man in his power to resist nicotine."

"Dr. Shepard of Colorado, U. S. A., testified to the evils of tobacco in no uncertain tone when he wrote:

"In my twenty-five years of treating tuberculosis exclusively, the time came when I refused to receive a cigarette fiend in my sanitarium unless he quit tobacco Because the constant irritation of cigarettes on mucous surfaces of the lungs neutralizes to a fatal extent any treatment that may be administered."

Again we read:

"Of sixty-seven candidates for the medical department of the United States Army during the Spanish war, forty-three were rejected because of tobacco heart, officially and medically so declared."

"Much more could be offered in evidence of the disastrous results following in the wake of the tobacco curse, but lack of space forbids. Let us say, however, that its use is overwhelmingly condemned by the military authorities, who require the best of our manhood and by the medical fraternity, and should be condemned as a whole by the religious communities."

LIBELLING CHRISTIAN LOVE.

A persistent effort is being made to make it appear that it is the part of Christian love to be tolerant of ruinous unbelief and to leave it uncombated. Those presenting this view insist that love is ever amiably passive and essentially nonresisting. This is nothing short of libeling that noble fruit of the Holy Spirit.

It was Paul, the author of that beautiful tribute to love found in the 13th Chapter of First Corinthians, who, when false teachers were trying to get in their work among the early Christians, declared, "But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you, than that which we have preached unto you, "Admiral Albert Ross, of the U.S. let him be accursed." (Gal. 1:8).

> It was St. John, proverbially the apostle of love, who wrote these strong words: "If there come any unto you and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him Godspeed; for he that biddeth him Godspeed is partaker of his evil deeds." (2 John, 10 and 11.)

> 'God is love," yet it is He who has declared, "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God."

A mushy namby-pambyism is not love. The mother loved her child with a measureless affection, and should you seek to injure it, the same love that croons over its cradle, will fight to the death in its defense. Love is never nobler than when ilt stands fearlessly for the right, and bleeds and suffers to beat back the wrong.

To try to shelter destructive skepticism, capable of wrecking immortal souls, under the banner of Christian love, is one of Satan's most subtle devices.—The Southern Methodist.
