IN MEMORIAM.

The funeral of Madam Mary Jane Foster was held recently at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Fremont Foster, Kenduskeag, Me. Madam Foster was born in Jacksonville, New Brunswick, Canada, April 12th, 1839, eighty-five years ago. Her parents were Henry and Sophronia Sipprell. She with her parents came to Newburg, Maine, when a very small child, living here until she married Amasa Foster and went to Hermon to live and here

her children, Fremont D., Ernest D. and Addie P., were born. They removed to Aroostook County and settled at Monticello as pioneers. In the year of '73 she with her husband and family went to California, settling in Tuolunio County. Two years later they settled in Norwalk, Los Angeles, where they made their home for forty-eight years excepting a few years in visiting Maine.

Sister Foster was converted when only fourteen years of age; then twenty-six years later she sought the truth of our Lord's words, "I have come that ye might have life and that ye might have it more abundantly," and through prayer and consecration, received the blessed ex-

perience of Sanctification.

After the death of her husband, which occurred in the year 1892, Sister Foster consecrated her life to the Lord's work, and labored diligently in His vineyard, becoming the pastor of the Holiness Church at Yarvanza, Calif., where she was pastor for some time, later devoting her time more especially to mission and temperance work, as she was an active member of the W. C. T. U. Three years ago she accompanied her daughter and sonin-law, Mr. and Mrs. Fremont Foster, to Kenduskeag, Me., bringing her church letter and uniting with the United Baptist Church of which it was my privilege to be pastor. Her godly life, her power in prayer was a wonderful help to pastor and church. Quite early last fall she ceased to attend worship on account of ill health and though a great sufferer at the last, she bore that suffering patiently, and as we visited her the day before her going home, when we prayed with her, with the old time ring she said, "Amen!" assuring us that she was just "waiting for the Lord to take her home."

After seventy years of faithful, loving service in the Lord's vineyard, she was taken to her reward, and as we looked into her happy silent face for the last time, we felt, what a privilege had been ours to be the pastor of such a woman, of whom we can say, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, they shall rest from their labors but their works do follow them."

Madame Foster, who had lived to the advanced age of 85 years, was dearly beloved by all who were privileged to know her, in the Church and community. She was a devoted and loving mother, grandmother and great-grandmother, a true and loyal friend. She was tenderly cared for by her daughter, Mrs. Addie Foster, and by her granddaughter by marriage, Mrs. Harold E. Foster. She is survived by her daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Fremont Foster, her grandchildren, Mr. and Mrs. Harold E. Foster, Dr. and Mrs. Chester Foster, also great-grandchildren and more distant relatives and a host of friends from the Pacific to the Atlantic. The funeral was largely attended. The flowers were profuse and beautiful. Mrs. Violet Bagley, of Bangor, a former pastor and beloved friend of the deceased, officiated. Mrs. A. E. Foss sang one of Madam's favorite songs, "My soul is happy in Jesus." Fred Perkins, of Bangor, had charge of the arrangements. Interment in Kenduskeag cemetery.
