A great shock came to us in the sudden passing away of the editor of The King's Highway on Saturday morning, Sept. 27th. Brother Wiggins retired Friday night in his usual health. About five o'clock Saturday morning he complained of a pain in his breast. Sister Wiggins did what she could to relieve him, and called a doctor, who said the trouble was with his heart. All was done that could be for him without availing anything, and about ten o'clock he passed away.

The funeral service was held at three o'clock on Monday afternoon by a short service at the home, conducted by Pastor S. A. Baker, who read a few passages of Scripture, and prayer was offered by Rev. W. W. Howe, and the remains were taken to the church, where a large congregation had gathered, and the service was conducted. The choir sung "Face to Face." Scripture reading by Rev. H. Smith Dow, of Marysville, and prayer by Rev. G. B. Trafton, of St. John. Singing by the choir, "My Father's Welcome." Pastor S. A. Baker gave a brief sketch of Bro. Wiggins' call to the ministry and his labors. This was tollowed by an excellent sermon by Rev. P. J. Trafton, of Fredericton, from the words, "And Enoch walked with God"... "And God took him." After the sermon the choir sung "Eye to Eye" and Evangelist Rev. H. S. Mullen pronounced the benediction.

Brother Wiggins' remains were laid to rest in Elmwood Cemetery at Sunny Brae.
