Dear Editor of Highway:

Greetings in Jesus' name. Am glad to report victory from this part of God's vineyard. The Lord has been blessing us in Cambridge. Although we have a membership scattered in fifteen cities or sections of Greater Boston, yet the attendance at all our services is good, and the spiritual tide is steadily rising. Right here in the midst of the vain-glorious rationalism of Harvard and Boston Universities, we have a people that rejoice in the old-time power of New Testament salvation.

The first year of our pastorate here we saw some good cases of sanctification, a good increase in the attendance at all our services, and a wonderful financial gain. Our little band of about one hundred members gave last year hilariously for all purposes, nearly \$9,000.00, an increase of over 62% above the preceding year. This year we will go a long way beyond that, and best of all God has visited us with a gracious revival.

Rev. H. V. Miller, of Hartford, Conn., assisted us and gave splendid service. His preaching was strong, convincing and unctuous. For three weeks we saw seekers for pardon, reclamation or holiness at the altar in nearly every service, and there have been seekers since the meetings closed. The attendance was splendid and many from other churches were blessed. We give God all the glory.

We expect to be able to report five thousand dollars given by our church this Assembly year, for missions. Our Sunday School, seven years ago, gave eighteen dollars for missions; this year it gave over eight hundred dollars. Brother Roy Blaisdell, formerly of Fort Fairfield, is the energetic and popular superintendent.

We are planning for the coming of the Annual New England Nazarene Assembly the middle of April, and expect a great blessing to our church from that gathering.

Personally, I can say these are good days to my soul; am finding the way of holiness increasingly delightful. God has given me nearly thirty years in the ministry, without a single Sunday off through sickness. I have a beautifully sympathetic, appreciative and long-suffering people to serve. In all my ministry I have endeavored to put everything into the work. I find it pays. We own no automobile, house, bank account, or farm, but feel rich and secure in the promises of God, who does for me "exceeding abundantly above all I can ask or think."
