S. A. Baker (since deceased) on behalf of the Alliance, presented Mrs. Joseph Bullock with a beautiful bouquet of flowers, the occasion being her 86th birthday.

## REV. S. A. BAKER

Rev. S. A. Baker, one of the foremost ministers of the Reformed Baptist denomination since its organization in 1888, passed to his reward at Beulah Camp Ground, the place of all places dear to him, for he had spent many days of toil in the early years to make the camp meeting a success, and his interest and care never waned,

up to the very last a weakness of body and failing strength his spirn was indomnitable. He was a man of strong personality and great faith, who despised sham and cowardice, but loved truth and righteousness. It seemed his passing was planned by his Lord, for from what better place could his spirit have gone? The place he loved as his very soul, surrounded by the men and women with whom he had fought as a soldier of the cross for these many years. In his little cottage at Beulah Camp, on a point looking out on one of the most picturesque scenes in the natural world, his triumphant spirit took its flight from his worn-out body Friday morning, July 10th, at 10 o'clock, surrounded by his loving and devoted wife, his son, Mrs. I. M. Keirstead and brethren.

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Brother Baker was born at Woodstock, N. B., April 24th, 1853. His occupation in early life was that of a tailor, which vocation he pursued until his going into the ministry, and at one time afterward to help free himself from encumbrances. He was three times married; nine children were born, of whom only two survive. Bro. Baker was a licentiate in the F. C. B. church before the ministers were set aside. He had received the experience of entire Sanctification and was preaching it, and of course allied himself with the people who were disfellowshipped. When the Reformed Baptist Church was organized in Woodstock in the year 1888, he was ordained an elder in company with the late Revs. Aaron Hartt and W. B. Wiggins. He has held important positions, and his pastorates in these years have covered Meductic, Grand Manan, Saint, John, Fort Fairfield, Hartland, Woodstock, Fredericton and Moncton. He was for seventeen years editor and business manager of The King's Highway. He was treasurer of the General Missionary Society, in which office he functioned till the time of his death. He was at different times chosen as President of the Alliance. He is survived by his widow, one son, Sharp, of Toronto, and one daughter, Mrs. J. Burns, of Lowell. Mass. The funeral was held Friday afternoon in the Tabernacle at 3.30 o'clock, Rev. H. S. Dow officiating, assisted by Revs. G. B. Trafton, H. C. Archer. S. H. Clark and P. J. Trafton. Brother Dow gave a short address from Acts 11-24: Forhe was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost and faith; and much people was added unto the Lord. As his brethren and sisters in the ministry stood around the open casket, they united insinging "The Pearly White City." The body was taken to St. John the same evening, and the next morning, accompanied by his widow and son, was taken by train to Caribou, Me., and laid to rest beside those of his children, to await the resurrection of the Holy.
