At the close of the love feast. Bro. S A Mullen delivered a powerful and timely sermon from Isa 5:6, "I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it." The speaker compared the church to the vineyard, and showed that as the vineyard could not prosper and bear fruit if the rain was withheld, no more could the church, the vineyard of the Lord, if the anointings of the Holy Ghost were withheld. He then pointed out some reasons why the rains were withheld and suggested some conditions that would cause the rain to come again.

In the p. m. H. C. Mullen brought a message from Psalms 66.13-14, "I will pay thee my vows, which my lips have uttered, and my mouth hath spoken, when I was in trouble."
