We feel perhaps a word from this part of the field will not be amiss just now. God is still working in our midst. On Sunday evening last Brother McMillan spoke to a good audience and five requested prayer. Some have exchanged the path of blessing and duty for the tinsel of the world, but this I suppose is to be expected, for it has always been so and will always be the same.

I suppose there are some that are waiting for a report from our first pioneer work. I would like to say it was just as I expected when I went, that God would keep his word (Isa. 55:11). We began meetings on Tuesday evening, Sept. 15th, with a congregation of about twenty-five, which gradually increased. On Thursday Brother Alley preached a fine message to which responded and found God. The first week closed with two more at the altar seeking pardon. The next week we encountered a little battle when the secret orders rose up to bless the town with their services. Of course they owned the hall and we submitted to their request. They occupied it three nigths and we three.

During our three nights four more souls sought God. I understand their services gave no such report.

On the following Sunday evening we endeavored in our way, by the help of God, to show them where such things failed in the cause of God. This of course brought on the wrath of some and the approval of others. The town woke up Monday morning in the throes of a heated argument. Some argued over phones, while others went at it in closer range. Even state road workers had their argument pro and con. However, we know it would either make or break and all waited anxiously for Monday night. The hour for service arrived but curiosity and honesty had gotten ahead of father time and filled the house to its capacity. This week was an uninterrupted week and six more found God. On Sunday evening our last service, long before the hour arrived, the house was filled. They came from far and near until there were many cars parked about the hill, and the hall itself was packed and every available space being used including the aisles. At the close of the message the invitation was given and six more made their way to the altar of prayer. Many more were under deep conviction but did not yield, this making a total of nineteen for our labor for which we give God the glory.

At the close of the service we were given an unanimous call to preach for them on Sundays, which we accepted. The day closed with the testimonies of the new converts. The testimonies were given by boys and girls of twelve to men and women of sixty. A prayer meeting was organized for Thursday night. We had the pleasure of attending to the first prayer meeting and found to our surprise about forty or fifty people present. At the close of the prayer meeting six requested baptism which will take place a week from Sunday. May's God's richest blessing rest upon these dear people. Even though some opposed our teaching, otherwise we have only the highest of praise for them. L. J. SEARS.
