EDITORIAL

WHAT GOD HAS WROUGHT.

The meeting at Beulah this year will be the 32nd held on the ground. The first was held in 1894 and to those who have been fortunate in being able to attend each year there has come rich blessing. The first meeting was held in a tent. The first dormitory built was Cedardale, part of the down-stairs of this building was used for a dining room and there was a small rest room in the front. Cottages began to make their appearance. In 1897 the tabernacle that still stands took the place of the tent, and so year by year additions and improvements have taken place till now we have one of the best equipped camp grounds on the continent. The grounds have been beautified with gravelled walks everywhere, waste boxes at every turn, beautiful spring water playing from fountains, places for the weary to rest, a commodious dining room with good service, large airy rooms, bath room in hotel and toilets in the hotel and dormitories, an auto park where hundreds of cars are safe and protected, flowers and blooming shrubbery, the artificial lake and with the magnificent Saint John river flowing slowly by makes it almost too beautiful to describe. Last year the tabernacle was repaired and painted inside and out, through the generosity of our aged sister, Mrs. Joseph Bullock, who with her late husband and son, John, have always been our friends and have aided generously in all our advancement. How wondrously God has wrought, in opening the hearts and minds of the people. Those who have served on the different committees from year to year have done so without any remuneration and they have laboured faithfully and well.

Hundreds of seeking souls have found Christ in the pardon of their sins, hundreds more have been sanctified wholly, and thousands of saints have received encouragement and help and numbers of them have gone on to join the hosts above.

Aaron Hartt visiting us oftener than any other. God has certainly wrought for us, but we need to fear lest we get pride of heart, for we are in greater need of help from God than ever in the past. In many quarters the old landmarks are being obliterated, the trend to modernism is fearful, the decline in spirituality appalling; but God is still on the throne, and a mighty spirit of intercession on the part of his people, will bring the blessing and glory down. The God who lived in the Apostles' time is just the same today. We would not close this article without paying tribute to the grand men and women of our denomination who in those early years sacrificed everything for the cause of holiness; some have gone to their reward, we honour their memory, others are still with us, we appreciate them and we trust that the young men and women who are coming along will be of the same mind and spirit God has wrought for us in our missionary enterprises, how wonderful; but he wants us to make advancement at home as well as abroad.
