

Rev. W. W. Howe

Rev. Willmott W. Howe was born at Norton, Kings Co., July 2nd, 1870, where he lived for twenty-one years, removing to Saint John thirty-five years ago. On Nov. 9th, 1887, he was united in marriage to Angeline Colpitts, of Parleeville, Kings Co. To this union five children were born, all of whom survive. He was converted in a revival held at Mercer Settlement, when 17 years of age and one year later was sanctified wholly under the labors of the late Rev. A. Hartt. He was a charter member of the Reformed Baptist Church in Saint John. He felt the call to preach soon after his sanctification, but did not enter upon the work definitely till fifteen years ago. He was ordained at Beulah Camp Ground at the session of the Alliance in June, 1913, and since that time his has been an active ministry. Many will rise up in the last day to call him blessed. He was a success both as a pastor and evangelist. His sympathetic nature drew to him a host of friends. He was fearless in his denunciation of sin and a strong exponent of the two works of grace—Justification and Sanctification. He had been in failing health for some months past, but did not consult a physician till early in this year, when it was found he had high blood pressure and other ailments. He took a short rest, but could not content himself out of the active work. He has been pastor of the Church at Moncton the past year and was held in very high esteem, as testified by the large number from that church attending the funeral. His death took place at the Head of Millstream, where he was in attendance at the Quarterly Meeting. He was in the Friday night service, May 28th, and offered prayer at the opening and gave his testimony at the close. Little did we think that it would be the last testimony we would ever hear him give, it rang clear and definite to the cleansing and keping power of Jesus Christ. He was stricken that night about midnight and passed away the next day at 11.10 a.m. The remains were brought to his home in Saint John accompanied by Kenneth Northrup, that evening. The funeral service was held at the home Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock, the writer officiating, assisted by Rev. G. B. Trafton, of Saint John, and Rev. H. S. Dow, of Marysville. A very large number of friends were in attendance, some coming from long distance. The floral tributes were numerous and spoke in mute language of his worth. He leaves to mourn their loss his widow,

two sons, Willmoti T. and Samuel L.; three daughters, Effie M., Mrs. Willa E. Parks and Eva R., all of Saint John; two orothers, James L., of Saint John, and Charles W., of Norton. A large family of the saints deeply mourn the passing of our brother. He had a host of friends. To the sorrowing widow and children we extend our deepest sympathy.
