EDITORIAL

It is with deep sorrow and a sense of great loss that we record the death of another of our ordained ministers, Rev. W. W. Howe, of Saint John, but pastor at Moncton. Bro. Howe was ordained to the ministry in June, 1913, at Beulah. Although his ministry was of short duration, yet he accomplished much for the Lord. He was deeply interested in our work, and more especially in the home mission and evangelistic field. Nevertheless, he was a successful pastor. He felt more strongly the call to evangelism, and had his health permitted, he would have taken up that branch of work entirely. He had a genial and sympathetic manner that drew people to him for help and advice, hence he had a host of friends. He had strong convictions, and when he took a stand on any matter he considered right, he could not be turned aside. He was ever a strong exponent of Bible holiness in the two works of grace, and lived what he preached. It seems we could not well spare him at this time, but God knows best. Let us pray that his mantle will fall on another to take up his work.

We trust that the day set apart for special prayer, June 3rd, was a day of great blessing. It was in some sections at least. The saints who took time to wait on God for a special outpouring upon the camp meetings this year, received much of blessing on their own souls. The writer experienced one of the greatest victories and spiritual uplift in faith and hope; God gave signal victory, and we felt our prayers got through. Amen! Let us keep at it and continue faithful up to and through the camp meeting at Beulah, and then on to Riverside, and prove God and find that He is faithful that has promised.
