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EDITORIAL

BEULAH CAMP MEETING, ST. JOHN, N. B.

Beulah Camp Ground is one of the most artistic and best equipped camps. I have ever seen. It is located right on the bank of the famous St. John river at the end of the "long reach." One can see for ten miles down the river, and some distance up the river.

The camp ground is on a high hill covered with lovely white poplar and spruce trees. It has great ricks among the trees, and the spacious tabernacle stands on a solid rock foundation, and is beautifully designed and well built, painted on the outside and in, but on the inside the colors blend and make it not only beautiful, but give rest to the eyes. The neatness is also inspiring, to one's good taste.

The grounds landscaped—streets and walks, fountains pool lake brook river—by Brother Bullock a Methodist. He also gave largely to the upkeep of it until his home going and now his son takes his place in that respect. He is a fine holiness man. His mother is about ninety years old and one of the finest saints on the earth.

This camp ground is a dream and it would require some space to write up in detail. It has beautiful walks, one praise walk, one charity walk, hope walk, silver walk, golden walk, auto walk, with Bullock Avenue, and other avenues. At each street, avenue, or walk beginning is a steel frame about three feet high with something like a book rest telling you the name. And here and there is a beautiful rock with "Glory 'hallelujah!" or some scripture painted on it. Near by is a beautiful waste box highly polished, with brass hinges, and lifter on it, with grey raised letters, "waste box," on it. They would look nice in a home. There is Mt. Horreb, Lake Galilee, Brook Jabbock, Jacob's Well, River Jordan with its rustic bridge, and Siloam's pool, and Jacob's ladder, and many other interesting and lovely scenes.

The camp has one large and commod-room, and kitchen, with men's and ladies' parlor below, and one large lobby above ious hotel in which there is a large dining all. There are manyff nice rooms, with bath and modern conveniences. They have two large dormitories well fixed and comfortable, yet they could not accommodate the large crowd this year. They rented all the rooms adjacent to the camp, and some people slept in their automobiles. There are many beautiful cottages on the ground owned by individuals.

They raised in a few minutes two thousand dollars on Saturday night to begin a five thousand dollar dormitory to have ready for another year.

The camp is under the auspices of the Alliance Reformed Baptist Church of Canada. They are true second blessing people, and I felt right at home from the first service. There were fifteen souls at the altar the first service, and from five to twenty-five every service until the close, and there were not many repeaters. The work was clear, and all said that it was the best camp meeting in twenty years, but it was because the Holy Spirit was there in great power.

The song service was led by Prof. Parlee of Indiana who is a St. John boy. He is a fine fellow. They have some strong fine young men coming on. Rev. P. J. Trafton is editor of the King's Highway, their church paper. You will travel a long way to find better people than the Traftons, Clarks, Mullans, Sabins and our Brother from Woodstock whose name has just slipped me for the time being, and a host of holy women. They treated me royally on all lines, and entertained me well. The New Brunswick Canadians are fine people.

I wish that our good men who are at the head of our camps in the United States could visit the Beulah Camp. They would see how much just a little beautifying helps and inspires the outside people to come to the camp meeting. They came by the boat loads on Sundays, but not more than two-thirds of them could be seated in the large tabernacle. They were there from Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and from Maine, and Massachusetts. Rev. John Gould and wife, and Sister Moore from Boston came up to represent the Eastern Nazarene College, and were a great inspiration to the camp.

Brother Gould said that he was greatly surprised in this camp, that it went far beyond his expectation.

My good friends, Brother Smith and his daughter, were there from Whittier, Califronia, and how glad we were to see them.
