While praying two of his wives removed their snuff boxes from their persons and gave them up before the Lord, praying Him for strength never to take it again.

During the meeting the headman cried and cried, and seemed all broken up. He rushed off as soon as the meeting closed.

The two girls started home, still without food, as the day was nearly ended and there was no time to wait for some to be cooked. When reaching the kraal where they stayed the night before asking for some amabele and ground it, making a sort of gruel. Paulina said before they reached this kraal they hunted on the veldt for different roots, etc., that are edible, but still they were so hungry they did not know they would ever reach the huts.

But you should have seen her face as she told of the joy she had over this work and the interest in these people.

Beloved, pray for this part of the work. The section is large, many heathen, and God is working. I judge the distance from here to be sixteen to eighteen miles and over very high mountains and the Pongola river. I have heard of another group of people among these mountains who have no one to teach them about God. I am asking Him to give us these heathen also, and help us to have someone to send there soon.
