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## A SAFE GUIDE

There are false teachers many, and false christs will arise, and get great followings, and as time goes by they will multiply, and we are warned to not go after them, but in the face of God's word many will "turn from the truth, and will turn unto fables." On e should study their Bible closely, and be sure that there is plenty of scripture to buttress any truth, or doctrine that is being presented before they accept it. The Holy Spirit will not leave us in the dark in any matter that is of vital importance to us, or essential to our getting to heaven. "He (the Holy Ghost) will take the things of God and show them to us" (reveal them unto us), but he will not take anything that is not written, he will take the written word and interpret it to us, but His interpretations will be buttressed by a number of scriptures which he will bring to our mind, if he will but wait on him. When we think of Sandford, Dowie, and some present day leaders who have great followings who are unsound on their teachings, we wonder what will come next to deceive the people. A false spirit woud have us to be wedded to some personality, and regardless of whether they are sound in teachings or not, would have us

lose sight of dictrines and cleave to personality.

A person who is wedded to personality, and imbibes false doctrine readily, will give their money quickly, and hilariously, and thus the leader is soon enriched, and becomes popular, and rides upon the wave of popularity, and continues to prosper for a time in spite of all their opposition. It is hardly thinkable to a thoughtful person that a follower of the lowly Christ who had not "where to lay his head," and who made his home with orphan children, who could not pay his tax without performing a miracle, who died in poverty, and who was buried in a borrowed tomb, and who said, "if any man will be my follower let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me," that his true follower, or followers could rise from poverty to a multimillionaire in a period of ten or less years, if ever, no matter how long they live. We can readily undertand how one could receive large money if they were giving it to the poor, and worthy causes, thus advancing the kingdom of our Christ, and to spend, and be spent in his service, but to be the sole owner of property, and lay up great sums of money in banks, or to spend it in luxurious living, while a billion and more souls are dying without the knowledge of a Saviour who came to die in their stead, and to save them from an endles hell. Absolutely such a spirit is not compatible with the Spirit of Christ. If one will follow the safe guide, the Holy Spirit, his or her life will be a life of sacrifice, self denial, and of giving all the money that comes into their hands (after their living has been taken out) into the saving of poor lost souls. Mr. Wesley seems to have had the leading of the Spirit of God on the subject of money usage; he says, "make all you can, save all you can, and give all you can." Of course Mr. Wesley meant to make all you can legitimately. The danger of the holiness movement by whatever name it may be called, is to spend too much money in buildings, and place heavy burdens upon the people, envolving them with debts, and make it impossible to evangelize the world as the Lord intended that we should, and thus hinder His soon coming back to earth again. We believe in plain, modest, comfortable places of worship, and large enough to take care of our congregations, but we are liable to follow the oldline churches in this respect to the hindrance

of our holy cause. The Spirit of God will guide us in this matter if we will listen to his voice. My beloved brothers and sisters in the Lord, there is but one safe guide, but thank God there is a safe guide—the Holy Spirit who will always guide us aright in every detail of private and public life if we are careful to obey his voice, and are willing to follow him. The Spirit always leads in harmony with God's written word, and never counter to it. Beloved reader, read your Bible daily, prayerfully, with a willing heart and mind to obey the leadings of the Spirit, and you will never be on unsafe grounds. nor will you live in the land of doubts, you will have a clear leading, a sweet experience. a consciousness of the presence of your safe guide, and you will not be led astray by faise teachers, and false prophets.
