and a Christ-despiser if he so desires. But our next appointment is found in Heb. 9:27. Here Paul says, "And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after that the judgment." Here the reader will see that we have an appointment that is not left optional with man. He is going to die whether he desires it or not. Behold, there is no use for a man to do wrong in Ohio and run to old Mexico, for the school teachers tell us that this planet on which we live is a round ball and, if that is so, then every man is on the outside and also every man is right on top.

In the next place there is no way on earth for a man to get off. God has him cooped up here and he can't escape. Again I want every man to remember that the world in which we live is a very dangerous world. There never have been but two men who got out of it without dying, and they were both Holiness men. Bless God, that is encouraging to us Holiness folks, that the only two men that ever did get off this planet alive were Holiness men. The reader will see that he must accept this appointment.
