Dear Editor of the Highway:

Just a line of personal testimony and a little report of our work. These are good days to my soul and the last two years as supply pastor to the Pilgrim-Nazarene Church of Cambridge, Mass., have been the best years of my ministry. I never served a more loyal, spiritual and sacrificial people. In all our meetings we feel the inspiration of the Holy Ghost. I came home on Sunday night saying, "Lord, a day in Thy courts is better than a thousand." The secret of the inspiration is found in a people—that love to fast and pray and also to pay.

We are glad to have Sister Doyle, of Westchester, N. S., with us. She is most appreciative of our humble ministry and is a real inspiration to us all.

We are planning to build a holiness tabernacle and are negotiating for the lot. God has helped us wonderfully and if we keep hot and sweet He will do the exceeding abundantly. Brethren, let us keep the holy fire and the unction upou our souls. If we don't, then we will be no more than any other preachers and a good deal less, for we have had the light and must keep the goods on hand.
