Dear Highway:

Some time has gone into the irrevocable past since this field was reported, so we offer a few remarks. We greatly enjoyed the excellent quarterly meeting held with the Millville Church, Sept. 1-4. It was a profitable season to all, and we are anxious for it again next season.

Following this meeting Rev. E. W. Lester came with us for services during the week for two weeks, and was a blessing to those who attended.

Since then we have had another baptismal service, adding to the several before, when a young lady followed in this beautiful ordinance, witnessed by a large company.

On October 2nd the Church building at Maple Ridge was re-dedicated. The interior has been refinished and in its new dress of Douglas fir and metallic ceiling of very artistic design looks very becoming as a place of worship. The work was accomplished by sacrifice on the part of some at least who will receive the greater blessing.

Rev. H. S. Dow, of Hartland, was the special speaker, and his addresses during the day were inspiring, and the day will not soon be forgotten by those present.

That community has recently sustained a severe loss in the removal of our late Brother Henry Hoyt to Fredericton a few weeks before his passing to his eternal reward.

We have greatly missed his cheering testimony and timely counsel.

We have held special services at Nortondale for two weeks, where a few found their way to God, we believe, and others were helped. Rev. F. A. Dunlop was with us two people and conducting the regular services. They told me that at Riverside I would be given my appointments. In the meantime I rested at Beulah, visiting Grey's Mills and Apohaqui and holding services over Sunday in each place.

The Lord withheld our Board from making out a list of appointments, and at Riverside I was told that from there I was to go to Westchester until Sept. 1st, when I was to attend the Quarterly Meeting at Salem, and stay and help them for a while. During the ten days spent among the dear Westchester people I visited and prayed in sixty homes, and held ten services and had the joy of seeing sixteen souls claim victory.

Of the quarterly here, you read in the Highway. The very evening of our arrival, at prayer in the field, the Lord put such a burden on my heart for these poor pastorless people that I could not stay my tears even on my return, and got the folks in the house to pray with me. The young man who so earnestly prayed through to sanctification that night has been pressing on ever since, and his prayers have been a factor in the salvation of a number of souls. He now confesses a call to the ministry.

That the Lord has sent a revival to Salem was apparent to us all before the close of the Sunday services, so though neither Brother Trafton nor Brother Mullen could be spared from their charges, the services were announced and started, and when they have not been here to help, I have had to carry on "alone."

For twelve weeks the services have continued, and neither the interest nor the blessing have abated. There has been no great break, nor excitement, many hard and discouraging things, stiff, fighting, all along the way, but solwly, and steadily the work has gone on. Souls first saved, have pressed on to sanctification, and these too have grown stronger. Thirty-eight have claimed salvation and thirty-one pressed through to Holiness.

It has been wonderful to see God work, drawing the people, in spite of bad weather and poor roads. After a long hard day on the farm, trying to get their crops harvested in the wet, fathers and mothers, with their little ones, young men on bikes, some walking for miles, came and filled that little Church night after night. Often through the pouring rain, when one would not think a service possible, a faithful hungry little handful would gather, and some of our sweetest services were given. Family altars have been repaired, others started, drunkards saved, tobacco slaves delivered, brethren reconciled, confessions and restitution made, folks given a new vision and a burden for unsaved friends and relatives, and two promising young men have been called to His harvest field. The strength and health He has given me, to carry on so long has been nothing short of a miracle, and I am very grateful. The large hearted hospitality of our precious Brother and Sister Martin, unwearied through the months, when they have warmed, lighted and cleaned the church, and entertained crowds of outsiders over Sunday, and provided a home for his children here has contributed largely to the success of the meetings.

their love and hospitality have comforted and refreshed me. Both in this and in many other ways they are a great people to work among.

I have been deeply thankful for the privilege of working with our faithful Brothers Trafton and Mullen, and in the hearts of these people their self-sacrificing services here have found them a big place.

Friends, here we have a little flock of faithful souls, in a community favourable to the doctrine of holiness, and possibilities opening out on every side. If this work is to stand, we must have a pastor. With the Head of Millstream and Norton folks, they would not find it hard to support him, and the right man has a great work awaiting him here. Who will come? Let us pray the Lord of the harvest to send him while the tide of blessing still flows.
