#### EDITORIAL

#### ALTONA

This is the name of the new Mission Station that the Sterritt Sisters will open. This has been an outpost for a number of years. Five years ago the government granted to us one acre of ground on which to build. Of course this is not as much land as we would desire, but we will trust the Lord to make it possible that we can obtain more at the proper time. The Sisters have undertaken to build a Rondeval with their own means. We admire the spirit of self sacrifice on the part of all our missionaries in the past, and this is only another instance of their desire to push the work. Altona is 20 miles by trail and 40 miles by road from Balmoral or Hartland, Natal, as it is now called, and is in the Transvaal. This is the section in which Isaya, our native worker, was holding forth. A small church building had been started, but there had not been any funds to finish it; it lacked a roof; the Sterritt Sisters gave the money to Isaya and before this the roof has been put on. We certainly believe this to be of the Lord, and will mean the extension of our work, as white missionaries are needed in these different sections to supervise the work of the native preachers. Our God is leading on to certian victory in our foreign work. Dr. H. C. Sanders will remain the head of our work; they will have their Quarterly Meetings at Hartland, where all questions relative to the extension and good of the work can be discussed. We are sure the Lord led in the establishment of our work in Africa, and we are just beginning the expansion which must take place; other stations manned by white missionaries will follow in the after years. This will put a larger responsibility upon us at the home base; we will need to pray more and give more and as we do this our hearts will also be fired with a new zeal in connection with the home work. The Sterritt Sisters were definitely led of the Lord in this move, just as definitely they claim as their call to go to Africa in the first place, anywhere with Jesus is what we sing, but it means a different thing many times when it comes to the test. The spirit of sacrifice will continue, as we continue to be filled with the Spirit of the Master. May we all keep the burning fire and power in our hearts and lives.
