DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

In the last issue of this paper attention was called to several important resolutions which were passed at Alliance this year. Among these is one in reference to the holding of a Sunday School Convention at the time and place of each quarterly meeting in the different districts. The idea was this: Considering the importance of the Sunday School in connection with the work of the church, and at the same time the lack of interest taken by many in connection with that work, it was thought best to try and stir up a greater interest in this department of the church.

It was suggested that at each quarterly meeting, one day be given to this, say the Wednesday before or the Monday after, when two sessions would be held. At 2.30 p. m. a conference on Sunday school work, and the problems of the different schools. Reports from the schools and delegates would also be received. In the evening a public meeting would be held when addresses would be given on Sunday School work in general. It would be necessary to appoint a "Secretary" in each district who would arrange for these meetings.

An offering also would be taken at each convention to be placed in a Fund to be used in defraying expenses, and the different schools would be urged to make their contribution to this fund. We are sure that if this plan is carried out it will prove a blessing to our Sunday School work.
