Jerusalem. He foretold the destruction of the temple and portrayed the judgment scene.

The last supper was eaten with His disciples, after which He conversed with them. We hear His marvellous intercessory prayer that the Father might glorify Him and preserve the disciples and all other believers.

The agony in Gethsemane, where Jesus was left alone, His betrayal and arrest was followed by the trial before the Jewish authorities—the insults heaped upon Him and the cruel crown of thorns was pressed upon His brow. Oh! the suffering of that night, when even Peter who had declared his love and loyalty, a few short hours before—denied that He knew Him! At last He was given to that howling mob to be crucified.

We cannot conceive of that inhuman torture. No wonder there was darkness over the whole land for three hours! But that long day of unspeakable suffering was to be ended. He cried with a loud voice and said: "Father into Thy hands I commend my spirit," and gave up the ghost.

He was tenderly laid in the new tomb, but, praise the Lord, the tomb could not hold Him, for early in the morning of the third day the angel announced to those women, "He is risen."
