The next day a heathen woman came to me and spoke about her two children getting these cards in the school, and seemed so pleased about it. This shows, dear ones, how every little thing counts for Jesus.

Joeli is helping Isaya today finishing some work on the church. For this we are very thankful. Isaya's wife has been very ill for three days with a heavy cold. I am glad I have medicine with me. Her sister from Swaziland came here to visit her on Thursday and has been a mother to the children, and the cook for Isaya. The Lord surely sent her here just at this time to help them. Today I went to a nearby place, and had prayers at a half caste home. They seemed very pleased to have me and sent me a nice piece of meat. I am glad for this as my bread is finished now.

I sent to the Indian store some twelve miles away and got some flour and sugar, so I have made some sort of bread with baking powder and steamed it out doors in native style. I have been having some green corn and sweet potatoes, so I can count my blessings.

Monday p. m. Yesterday Isaya had a service at Emozane some twelve miles away. Joeli went to another place eight miles away, and I stayed here to care for the sick one and to have the service here at the mission station. Thirty people came, and we did have a very sweet time. The Holy Spirit was present. I spoke on Matt. twenty-five and first thirteen verses. The dear Lord blessed His Word.

Tuesday morning: The patient is some better so it seems we can return home today. My food is about finished as I have been now ten days away from home. I am trusting to return here again soon.

I am yours in Christ and glad to be in Africa.

We count on him being a great help there, and more especially since Samuel has been lame and unable to make his usual visits to that little flock.

Two infants were presented to the Lord, and are now known as "Church Babies"; and will be taught and brought up as Christians, asking, we trust, for baptism when old enough to fully understand.

Alfred Metula, pastor of our flock at Groospruit, beyond Paulpietersburg, was here with three other young men, representing the twenty church members, and as many more seekers. Your prayers are needed for Alfred and his little band, as they are not as strong as we wish to see them.

Entungwini and Kwa Meucu, in the Transvaal were represented, by some of our faithful ones, whose reports cause us to thank God for exalting

His name among the heathen.

There have been a number of recent deaths in the district, mostly from malaria, which has sobered the people. This, together with the drought, now broken, that caused half or more of the corn to perish, has caused these "careless Etheopeans" to stop and think. The general tone of our services was one of Victory and true hunger after God and his righteousness.

More and more we rejoice in the great privilege, "making all men see the mystery of the fellowship, which hath been hid from ages," and which is "Christ in you, the hope of glory." To see these Natives saved from the bondage of sinful heathenism, and superstitions, and walking with God, is something worth while. Testimonies of divine joy in spite of adverse circumstances, show us that they are learning to abide in the "secret place of the Most High and dwell under the shadow of the Almighty." So let us not be weary in well doing, for your labour, and ours, is not in vain in the Lord.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

The Grand Manan and Washington County Sunday School Association met in their Quarterly convention at Wood Island, Grand Manan, on Wednesday evening, May 16th., at 7:30 p. m.

With the president, Rev. F. A. Watson in the Chair, the meeting opened with singing, and prayer by Lic. Hollis Kimbell.

Following prayer, Rev. C. R. Hagerman gave an address from the subject "Qualifications of a Sunday School Faculty". First there should be deep spirituality, second, there should be devotion. Devoted to God's Word, devoted to prayer, devoted to the pupils under his charge. Creating in the child an interest for S. School, a hunger for the Word, a hunger for God, and a duty to God, and their fellow man. Thirdly there should be wisdom. Fourthly, there must be a vision. Seeing the possibilities undeveloped within the child and seeing the marvelous opportunity of the Sunday School. Fifthly, there must be Zeal.

At the close of Mr. Hagerman's address, Sister Faith Saunders brought a short address to the children. Sister Saunders also spoke to the children Thursday and Friday. Her chief subject was, "Love". She taught them that pure love, could only come from pure hearts. She brought many plain and simple illustration, easy to be understood by the children, to teach the principles of purity. At the close of her meeting Friday afternoon, there were a number of children came to the altar to seek the blessing of entire sanctification. While they might not have understood the doctrine of entire sanctification from a theological standpoint, yet we believe God understood their hearts, and we trust there was a work wrought by the Holy Ghost that will last through the eternities.

On Thursday at 2:30 p. m. Association met in conference. With the president, Rev. F. A. Watson in the chair, the session was opened with prayer. In the absence of the secretary, Rev. H. C. Archer, the Rev. C. R. Hagerman was chosen as secretary pro tem.

The minutes of the last meeting were read. Very encouraging reports were brought in from the schools. Seal Cove has an enrollment of 100 pupils, with an average attendance of 75. Wood Island has an average attendance of 47. Beals has an average attendance of about 80. North Head has an enrollment of 99, with an average attendance of 55. The Calais Sunday School has more than doubled in its attendance this last six months. It has an enrollment of over 100, and has an average attendance of over sixty. And it is

still increasing in attendance. There is a great interest in its Sunday School. The Sunday School is the Church of tomorrow. Our future church will be as strong as our present Sunday School.

The meeting was opened for discussion of the work. Brother Watson brought in the following question for discussion, "Should a Sunday School have contests, and give prizes as an incentive for building up the School? This question received much discussion. Think upon this question, and bring or send us in an answer to our next convention. Brother Kimbell raised the question, "What can be done to get the adult to attend the Sunday School? If you can solve this question and its problem, you will be laying a foundation for a strong Sunday School. It was suggested that it would be very beneficial if a small space could be given in the Highway to discuss the problem of Sunday School work.

The meeting adjourned to meet at the time of our next Quarterly meeting.
