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EDITORIAL

There are passages of Scripture that seem to stand out in bold relief, for instance: Gen. 17-1, Matt. 5-8, John 3-16, Eph. 5-25, 26, 27, Heb. 12-14, Rev. 22-14. What depths of truth are found in these, but the passage we are about to quote seems to us wonderful indeed. We never hear very many sermons preached from this text or articles written upon the same. Is it because it cannot be understood? Or is it because we fall so far short of the truth it contains? The passage we refer to is Hebrews 2-11. For both he that sanctifieth and they who are sanctified are all of one, for which cause he is not ashamed to call them brethren. It would seem to us that there is a depth of meaning here that the most of us fail to grasp. Jesus became one with us in our humanity, that we might become one with him in purity, suffering, aspiration, desire, etc. This seems almost staggering to us. We are to be one with Jesus in love; here we must pause and would ask ourselves, have we loved with Jesus and like him. Paul seems to enter this sphere as he writes in Rom. 9-3, Jesus to save us, separated himself from the father, to come to this world to suffer, to be misunderstood, persecuted ,etc. How far short we come in all these respects. For which cause he is not ashamed to call them brethren. It would seem to us the way many professed Christians conduct themselves, and many that profess holiness can hardly expect to be called cousins, let alone brethren. There is so little in manifestation of love, sympathy, patience, kindness, longsuffering, faithfulness, etc. Brethren with Jesus! What a thought! It should drive us to our knees in abandonment of ourselves to God, until all of dross is consumed and we shall be changed from glory to glory, and we shall be one with him; and then the prayer of Jesus will be answered, "that they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me. Let us examine ourselves in God's mirror, then not forget what manner of individuals we are.
