ALLIANCE AND CAMP MEETING.

The Alliance and Camp Meeting of 1928 have passed into history. The Alliance has passed its fortieth birthday. There was no special celebration of the anniversary during the Alliance, but such a celebration will be held at Woodstock, N. B., where the Alliance was organized Nov. 3rd, 1888. The Camp Meeting was begun at Beulah 35 years ago and those that were then present review with varied emotions the great changes which have taken place.

The business of the Alliance this year was carried through with dispatch and beautiful harmony. There was not a discordant note in all the proceedings. The editor of The King's Highway was elected as President, and Rev. G. R. Hagerman Vice-President. Rev. H. C. Archer remains the Secretary; Rev. I. F. Kierstead is assistant; Rev. H. S. There was a large number of young people in attendance and they seemed full of determination to follow the Lord, and our hearts were made to rejoice to see young men and women offering themselves to the work of the Lord.
