Dear Homeland Friends:

We have had the hottest March we have ever felt in Africa. It was as terrible as in mid-summer and no rains for weeks. The situation was becoming serious, but the dear Lord in answer to prayer sent a good soaking rain last week, lasting all one night, and we do praise Him for the good it has done and for the change it brought in the dry, scorching atmosphere. We have had some lovely cool nights, but it is growing warmer now again. We trust we will get more rain this month to help out the winter grazing.

I have heard from the sheep farmer from whom I bought my horse four years ago. He has another which he thinks will suit me very well and will bring it down from the high veldt when he comes with his sheep, about the second week of May. I do praise the Lord for the prospect of a horse and trust it will prove a suitable one. By that time it will be safe to leave horses out, and also to start brick-making, so we hope to get back to Altona then.

We are glad to be here this month, as Miriam and Grace have gone away for a holiday to Durban and another sea-side place, and we can be of service here during their absence. We do thank the Lord for arranging this trip for them as Miriam especially needs the change very much, and it is lovely for them both. We hope it will be a delightful holiday for them-we know it will be.

I want to express my sincere thanks in this letter to the Editor and those whom I see by the Highway have so kindly contributed toward a new horse for me. This, when there are so many demands for money, has seemed to me so very thoughtful and kind and I do appreciate it so much. It is another of the many tokens of His love to us in this far-off land through the hearts of His dear children in the homeland, and we do thank you and Him with grateful hearts. I do not know all your names, nor where you live, but Jesus does, and I am sure He will bless and reward urging him to eat it. His reply to them was: your loving sacrifice, and I take this opportunity to thank you all.

Here are a few cases that will interest you. They came to notice at our Easter meetings.

Salome came on Friday and asked for special prayer. She suffers from asthma anr is bad at times. After the little service of prayer she went away strengthened and helped, and reported Sunday she was better.

Jona Myeni, one of our workers across the Pongola, gave a good testimony in Sunday morning meeting, but asked special prayer as he felt ill and weak in body.

He had been given a piece of meat to eat and shortly after he felt sick and parts of his body swelled; he had bad dreams. He is a good Christian and a doctor. The medicine he took did him no good. He continued to dream each night of seeing bad meat and people "No, I eat nothing unclean." "Pray for me, for I know if I eat that meat I will die."

We had an after-meeting, a sweet service of prayer. Today he says he has great victory. He dreamed last night he saw some one sweeping, and believes God has swept all the evil things away.

Beloved, this may read like childishness to you, but it is a real thing to him, and a real victory over superstition.

Filita Hadebe, Befa Kunene and her mother and a man named Job are all being much tested by different cases of witchcraft, and several others also.

In this land if a child dies, some one must have caused its death; the person who did it has bewitched it, etc., etc. To these who are now Christians but not completely overcoming this fear, it takes grace to cling to Jesus alone and not give way to the pressure brought to bear upon them by heathen relations and neighbors. It is a most terrible thing to them to be pointed out as a witch, made to move away from the district they are living in, etc.

Beloved, they have come out from these things and do no longer consult a wizard themselves, but their heathen friends still live in the darkness they came out from and have many ways to terrify believers unless they have gone on with God and been deliver-

ed not only from the dreadful works of evil, but also from the dreadful bondage the fear of these things brings to them.

We stand by them, plead the promises for them, instruct them as to what the word of God says about separating from all these things and His power to deliver them from "all the power of the enemy." Some have gotten great victories, others are seeking and daring to step out on God's promises to deliver them. I believe He will.

Much malaria is abroad in various parts of days He is strengthening my faith and I do the land and many deaths have taken place. This causes the living to stop and think.

South Africa has had many problems to solve during the past three or four years. Government has passed several laws which, to us, seem very hard on the colored and black races. Giving them no respresentative in Parliament, cutting them off from doing certain classes of skilled labour and several other things which is very detrimental to the development and uplifting of these negro

Also it has been heavily smitten by drought in Cape Colony and the Karoo. Thousands of people who a few years ago were prosperous farmers, or were making a good living, have been reduced so in circumstances they are having to receive help from the Government.

Think of a man who three years ago had 3,000 sheep, today only a few tens of them

Think of the cattle, sheep, donkeys and horses that have either died or just living bags of skin and bones!

For three years no rains, no grass, no crops and then famine so the Government has to issue rations of food to thousands of these same people who once were well off.

At last the rains came in March and in one storm more rain fell than for a whole year. Dams that had long been dry overflowed and one costing £50,000 was broken so it is a "broken cistern that can hold no water." Rivers became so flooded that the people in the Sundays River valley had to leave their homes and fly to the hills for safety. Latest reports say nine lives have been lost, much
