The paper has been run all these years without a single advertisement, outside of denominational work.

She said there were only two of the original committee now living, who met to make arrangements for the organization, namely N. T. Baker and C. N. Scott. Brother Dow moved a vote of thanks to the Woodstock people for kind care and hospitality Saturday evening was given to celebrate the organization of the Woodstock Church. On November 3rd, 1888, the Woodstock Church was organized in the vestry of the present building by Revs. Wm. Kinghorn, G. W. MacDonald and Aaron Kinney, with forty-one members, and the next day fifteen more were added. Truly a historic time. The pastors have been Revs. G. W. MacDonald, J. H. Coy, A. H. Trafton, W. B. Wiggins, S. A. Baker, H. C. Archer, H. S. Dow and a second term for Rev. W. B. Wiggins, W. W. Howe, L. J. Alley, F. T. Wright and E. W. Lester.

The deacons have been S. L. Churchill, J. E. Drysdale, Simon McLeod. Israel Churchill was an honorary deacon. A. J. Marsten, Dr. J. E. Jewett, Judson Burpee, Chas. Mutch, B. M. Colpitts and Harry Clowes.

Trustees—On June 16th, 1891, the church property was duly transferred to J. E. Drysdale, A. J. Marsten and Samuel A. Britton. Later Trustees were H. G. Noble, C. N. Scott, Rev. B. Colpitts, O. R. Estey and C. P. Phillips, Robert Harding.

Clerks-C. N. Scott (who served thirtythree years of the forty), Aaron Clark, H. G. Noble, P. J. Trafton and B. M. Colpitts.

Treasurers-A. J. Marsten, H. G. Noble, Saturday afternoon at 2.30 was held the B. M. Colpitts, Geo. H. Arnold, O. R. Estey, H. T. London and Geo. B. True.

In all, sixteen ministers have been members of this church-Revs. G. T. Hartley, G. W. MacDonald, S. A. Baker, B. Colpitts, Aaron Hartt, W. B. Wiggins, G. B. Trafton, M. S. Trafton, C. M. Blaisdell, S. H. Clark, P. J. Trafton, A. H. Trafton, H. S. Dow and Frank Watson. Harvey Blaney is now a student at Eastern Nazarene College, preparing for the ministry. The total membership from first to last have been three hundred and ninety-nine, of whom one hundred and sixty-three are scattered North, East, South and West, many of whom are still standing true. We bought the church with a debt of thirty-three hundred dollars against it, pulled through that and finished the upstairs at a cost of twenty-three hundred and ninety-six dollars, and dedicated the church with all bills paid and a surplus left of twenty-eight dollars. Of course without any bazaars, suppers, sociables or plays. Tobacco is cut out. Of course we are thoroughbred prohibitionists for we love God and holiness, therefore we love to uphold God's cause by giving of our means.
