

sequently their baptisms are null and void.

I know some persons that have been baptized three times already and I have wondered what would happen if they came under the influence of all these re-baptisms the same day. They would surely get a good **washing whether they got any other good or not.**

As I said before, I believe that those who have in the fear of God been immersed in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, by a minister of the Gospel, have been truly baptized, and to my mind it is a sacrilege, and savors somewhat of blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, for them to discount and throw away that which they received of God in good and sincere faith.

If a person may answer and say they were deceived in the first case, I would like to ask them what proof they have that they are not deceived now. People that have made loud profession that they were fully saved and had the clear witness to it, but now claim they have new light and discount altogether their past experience, must want us to believe that they were sailing under false colors then or are doing it now. If they would claim then what they did not possess, they might do the same now.

The very fact that people are moved about in this manner shows at once that they are not settled in their experience, and that they are trusting more to ordinances and the doctrines of men than to the Holy Ghost. When a person has a heart perfected in divine love, and is resting with quiet assurance under the precious blood of Jesus, with the sweet witness of the Spirit to their acceptance with God, it would be useless for anyone to approach them with their fine spun theories. They could say to all comers, "You are too satisfied with Jesus, and his love is flooding my soul. Hallelujah!" The persons that usually get caught are hungry souls that never had any clear conception of Christianity, and those that have had clear light on the experience of holiness but refused the light. Some that have had the experience of a clean heart and have compromised and lost **it are also fine subjects** for proselytes and love to ease their conscience by becoming enthusiasts in some new-fangled religion that offers an easier way and saves the life of the "old man." Paul says, "It is a good **thing that the heart be established with grace,**" and our only safety is in keeping our hearts warm with the love of God, fully sanctified and filled with the Holy Spirit.

The nicest point of all which relates to Christian perfection is that **which** you inquire of. This much is certain: **they** that love God with all their heart, and all **men** as themselves, are scripturally perfect. And surely such there are, otherwise the promises of God would be a mere mockery of human weakness. Hold fast this; but then remember, on the other hand, you have this treasure in an earthen vessel; you dwell in a poor, shattered house of clay, which presses down the immortal spirit. Hence all our thoughts, words and actions, are so imperfect, so far from coming up to the standard—that law of love, which, but for the corruptibility of the body, your soul would answer in all instances—that you may well say, till you go to him you love—**"Every moment, Lord, I need the merit of thy death."**—Wesley.
