WHY I AM A CHRISTIAN

1. I was lost, and unable to save myself. I felt guilty before God, and knew that I was unfit to appear in His presence. I found that, strive as hard as I could, I was unable to remove the load of guilt, and I feared that I was doomed to despair.

2. I learned that Christ could save me. I read in the Bible that Christ had come, "To seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10). My heart longed for deliverance, and I was certain that my case was hopeless unless Christ did undertake for me. I knew that I had no worth or merit upon which to base my petition, and wes fearful lest He might not accept me. But when I read: "Him that cometh unto me I will in no wise cast out" (John 6:37), I decided to present my case unto Him.

3. Christ forgave my sins. As I knelt before Him, my heart was broken up, and tears flooded my eyes and coursed down my cheeks. I was overwhelmed with sorrow and shame because of the sins I had committed against such a loving, compassionate being. I did not dare to look up, but knelt there trembling, scarcely daring to believe mercy would be extended to me. But Jesus lovingly laid His hands upon me, and said: "Thy sins be forgiven thee. Go and sin no more."

4. A great change came into my life. The burden of sin, which had weighed me down, was lifted from my heart, and the consciousness of guilt disappeared. Immediately my soul was flooded with joy and peace, and I felt a holy thrill go through my entire being. My hopes, plans and preferencès all underwent a radical change. I now delight in some things which I had a strong dislike for prior to my conversion, and there are many things which previously had held my atention that have no attraction for me now.

5. I have a desire to serve Him. From the moment when Christ so freely forgave my sins, my chief desire has been to do His bidding, and His blessings attend me as I perform the task which He assigns me. Also, when I see the awful ravages of sin, and see many of my fellowmen floundering in the slough of despond, my heart goes out to them of a Saviour who is "Mighty to save, and strong to deliver."

6. I enjoy felowship with Him. I find great joy and satisfaction in the holy fellowship which I have with Christ my Lord. He is the one "Altogether lovely," and "Fairer than ten thousand to my soul." I am completely captivated by the sweetness of His character and methods of operation, so that companionship with Him is my chief ambition. 8. I enjoy the fellowship of Christian brethren. I find a kindred spirit and a delightful environment in the company of those who are followers of Jesus Christ. I enjoy their fellowship very much, and find that this class, though abused and misunderstood by the ungodly, comprises the best people on earth. From this company have come those who have been most prominent in the reform movements of civilization, and are the "Salt of the earth" which today prevents total putrification of the moral and spiritual world.

9. I do not wish to suffer the torments of hell. The Bible informs me that those who despise and reject Jesus Christ as their Saviour will be barred from the presence of the Heavenly Father, the heavenly host and the Blood-washed throng throughout an endless eternity.
