Leonard Slipp Kinney died suddenly in Bangor, Monday, June 17th, about 12 o'clock, after being confined to a hospital the past seven years. He was born in Bedell Settlement, near Woodstock, N. B., July 3, 1877, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kinney. He came to Fort Fairfield with his parents when about 12 years of age.

Mr. Kinney was married April 9th, 1907, to Miss Zada Ellen Taylor, who survives. Four children also survive, as follows: Albert, at home; Edna, now Mrs. Aubrey Lovely, Waterbury, Conn.; Ruth and Winston, at home. He also leaves four brothers, Dr. William D. Kinney, Osterville, Mass.; George W., Amesbury, Mass.; Harry E., Pittsfield, and Roy L., Fellsmere, Fla., also one sister, Mrs. John Ashley, Foxboro, Mass.

SOCIAL REFORM

We, your committee on Social Reform, beg leave to report as follows:

We regret that we have seen very little that is encouraging in the present situation. Vice and immorality are prevalent, it would seem, to a greater degree than ever before, and we feel that this is due in no small part to the lack of prohibition legislation in regard to the use of alcoholic beverages in this country.

We deplore the indulgence in strong drink and tobacco by the people in general, and especially the increasing widespread use of wines and cigarettes by women and young girls, in view of the menace which such habits are to future generations.

We commend the action of certain women's organizations in protesting against the publication of cigarette advertisements in women's magazines, and we congratulate them on their success in securing the removal of some such advertisements.

The use of profane and indecent language is too commonly heard, especially in public places. We wish to protest against this and to urge upon our people the avoidance of slang terms, and in this connection would call to mind Matthew 5:37.

In conclusion, we would urge upon our churches, and each individual member, the necessity of leading lives which are pure and blameless before God and before the world, remembering the command of our Master: "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."
