### EDITORIAL

#### RIVERSIDE CAMP MEETING

As no one else has reported the Camp Meeting at Riverside, Robinson, Me., Aug. 9-18, I feel it is my duty and privilege to do so. The weather was all that could be desired during the entire time, except the first Sunday it rained considerably, but the crops needed the rain, so we thank God for it. The crowd the last Sunday was one of the largest ever seen at the camp, and on the whole very orderly too. Repairs which were needed on the tabernacle and hotel were undertaken and completed before the beginning of the meeting; other repairs were made and one new building erected during the camp meeting. There is no waning in the spirit of those interested in Riverside Camp meeting. Praise the Lord. This camp is being held strictly on the lines of full salvation.

The President was not able to be present at the beginning, and did not arrive until Tuesday, Aug. 13th. Rev. H. S. Dow, of Hartland, by request, had charge of the meeting until the arrival of the presiding officer. The committees had their work well in hand and so everything moved along in blessed harmony and beautiful fellowship. There was not a large number of ministers present at the beginning, but ere the close a goodly number arrived.

Revs. E. W. Lester, F. A. Watson and Brother Beryl Kimball were the song leaders, and Miss Hazel Mullen had charge of the special music. Brother J. F. Bullock presided whole-heartedly at the organ, and Miss Glenna Briggs officiated at the piano. The president was gratified with the hearty co-operation of the brethren, everyone willingly filling the position assigned them. Miss Hazel Mullen had charge of the children's and young people's meetings until the arrival of the Sanders family on Thursday, the 15th, who gave valuable assistance at these services as well as at others.

The ordinary routine of service was carried out consisting of early prayer meeting at 6 a. m., people's meeting at 9.30, preaching at 10.30, children's meeting at 1 p. m., preaching at 2.30, young people's meeting at 4, with a woman's prayer meeting at the same hour, open air ring service at 6 and preaching at 7.30. On Sunday an open air service was held at 1 o'clock p. m. as well. All these services

were well maintained and were seasons of rich blessing. A large number of children gave themselves to the Lord in the children's meeting. It was wonderful the way the finances came in and without taking any pledges our obligations were easily met and we thank God.

The evangelist was Rev. H. V. Miller, Supt. of the New York District, Church of the Nazarene, of Brooktondale, N. Y. He came to us in the fullness of the blessing and his preaching was in the demonstration of the spirit and power of God; eloquent and convincing, he won the hearts of the people. A goodly number were at the altar for either pardon or purity.

We had a visit from Rev. John Gould, Supt. of the New England District, Church of the Nazarene, and Rev. E. E. Angell, Prof. of Theology, E. N. C., Mrs. Gould accompanied her husband. These reverend gentlemen spent two days with us, each one giving an inspiring sermon, which was owned of God. How rapidly the time passed till the closing service and then the good-bye. Every year there are the vacant chairs. Some who were present last year have gone to the great home above. We weep with those who remain, but we rejoice in the thought of that great gathering on the eternal shore. We would not forget to mention our own brethren in the ministry, who preached in the power of the spirit, and laboured with their hands to make the meeting a success, and how faithful our young men and boys laboured with happy hearts and shining faces. Praise God for the holiness camp meeting. We are planning some improvement for next year in roads, parking space, cleaning up of grounds, etc., for the camp meeting is a great opportunity for promoting holiness. Mention must also be made of the good women, who hold such deep interest in the welfare of Riverside camp.

#### SILVER LAKE CAMP MEETING, WILMINGTON, MASS.

Silver Lake Evangelical Camp Meeting closed on the evening of Aug. 11th, with a goodly measure of victory. All who have been regularly attending this Camp Meeting during its fourteen years' history agree that the meeting just closed excelled any previous session. Many things conspired to make it a beautiful meeting. The weather was ideal, and attendance steadily increased, when on the last Sunday the spacious tabernacle was filled to overflowing. A beautiful spirit of unity and harmony prevailed. The early morning prayer meeting was a time of refreshing and drew many worshippers. The spirit of prayer was upon many on the grounds. Messrs. Edwards and DeWare, and Mrs. Burns were the instrumentalists and made wonderful harmony on piano, cornet, violin, trombone, saxophone and marimba. The leadership of the presiding elder of New England District, the Rev. Thomas Laite, was in evidence. He not only superintended the meeting, but also led the singing to the satisfaction of all, and preached two strong sermons. The children's meeting was conducted by Rev. C. E. Willson. A. Lowell daily gave our camp meeting prominence, and Rev. E. Wayne Stahl acted as reporter. Speaking relatively, the finances came easily.
