Seal Cove, Grand Manan, N. B. Dear Highway Readers:

Just a few lines from this part of the field. After our Camp Meeting at Beulah we made a very enjoyable trip up to our old home at Millville, then across the Maine border at Millville Jct., and from there down to Brunswick, Me. We saw some very nice places over in that locality. While there we visited Brother Lanpher's Church in Portland, and had the privilege of hearing him preach on the Second Coming. Brother Lanpher is a Nazarene. We also visited Bath, Auburn, Lewiston, and stopped a few minutes in Lisbon Falls, the home town of our dear Brother Moses. We visited the great Shiloh establishment.
