able in the service of praise when worshiping a holy God. The Book of Psalms is without a flaw. They were given by inspiration of God Himself. TAKEN IN BY SCIENCE

Mr. J. W. McKean, a missionary of the American Sunday School Union, residing at Stronghurst, Illinois, has given the scientists a hard blow in a communication to the Chicago Tribune recently. He shows that their statements are very unreliable. Read the letter, as follows:

The statement made in your paper by A. W. Jamieson that "the church has fought the findings of science for the last thousand years and science has won every time" is about as far from fact as any one could wander in that many words.

Taking believers in the Bible as "the church" for that is what I think he meant, the church has merely followed the scientists all these years

and that is one thing that is hurting the church now.

There is no fact of science that disproves anything in the Bible when the Bible is rightly un. derstood, but theory is not science, and I am glad that Bible Christians are beginning to find that out.

Here are some of the things that scientists once taught as truths, and if the church believed these things they were merely following the scientists. Scientists once taught the earth is flat; the earth is the centre of the universe; the sun revolves around the earth; the earth is motionless; all space is filled with ether; all space is vacant; matter is made entirely from seven elements; the molecule is the smallest particle of matter; now the electron is the smallest particle of matter; the arteries are filled with air; the blood is still, not moving, in the body; geometry is a system of straight lines; there is no such thing as a straight line. And if the church believed these things it was simply because scientists taught them, and in all times scientists have made light of church people who did not accept their theories.

In 1806 a great scientific body in France enumerated eighty theories in geology which were in conflict with the Bible, not one of which is accepted as a fact today. I read recently a statement by a noted minister that he had just been looking through an old chemistry which he had studied when a boy and found there over fifty scientific theories then accepted as facts not one of which is so accepted today.

No well informed church man denies any proved fact of science, but all the best informed church men refuse to accept as facts mere theories simply because some professor or some society advances them, unproved.

One could almost fill a page of the Tribune with theories once accepted as facts by scientists but long since abandoned. Then why such wild statements as that made by our friend Johnson? -Free Methodist.
