It has been quite a while since I have written any report from my own church, and have not reported anything since taking the New Tuset church. We came here after campmeeting and found a few loyal people with a real interest in the work. One of the worst features of the work here is the fact that the membership are scattered so far from the church. The majority live over two miles away and some up to ten and twenty. The Sunday services have been well attended thus far, the majority being young people, mostly unconverted. But I want now to especially report our special meetings which followed the Quarterly meeting and continued over two Sundays. These meetings were truly owned and blessed of God, and left some real fruit that is still noticeable. Over twenty-five persons were at the altar during the meetings and some were real finders. Some were seeking restoration, but a number were newly converted. As a result I baptized six happy young people, three young men and three young women, on Sunday p. m., Sept. 29th. All these were received into church membership the same evening. The whole church was quickened and encouraged, and all who came were blessed and refreshed. The closing night saw the church packed, and though an altar service and later a testimony meeting was held, which made it pretty late, no one stirred to leave the building until all was over and the benediction said.

Brother Emery Cosman of Saint John was our evangelist and he went far beyond our highest expectation of him. He was present during the Quarterly and rendered efficient and much appreciated service by his playing and singing. He took well with the people and preached a clean clear message of full salvation under the direct anointing of the Spirit. He was directly helped by the Spirit and was carried out beyond his own expectations. He has the finest gift of bringing people to a decision and getting them forward to an altar of any worker I have ever employed, and that is saying a whole lot, especially when it is recalled that I have had H. S. Mullen with me. Bro. Cosman's experience as a salesman has been a good training, and stands him in good stead when dealing with the Gospel.

His doctrine is straight and he believes what he preaches. His playing and singing is of a high order and lent a real attraction to the meeting and contributed much to the success.

To the Editor of the Highway:

Travelogues are interesting. I have found the Editor's so, and so I venture to afflict your readers with a resume of my holiday experiences, which while a few weeks old are still fresh in my memory.

I left Boston on the morning of August 26th and after a pleasant day's run on the train arrived at Syracuse, N. Y., where I was met by my son-in-law, Mr. Lewis Andrews, head coach of Syracuse University. In the home we met not only our daughter and young son, but saw for the first time the wonderful baby girl of five months. Like her daddy she already shows athletic proclivities.

On Tuesday morning we took train for Circumatus, N. Y., a former charge of mine, where we saw the best revival in all our ministry. When we left there twenty-two years ago, we organized the holiness band into a district organization. Some said it would be only a flash in the pan, but the good work has been maintained. I had the privilege of preaching in the evening to some of the "old guard" and new members that have been added. Some of the resident pastors, high in Masonic Lodge, say this holiness organization is the greatest hindrance to their church work. Preachers identified with such worldly organizations have better appreciation of real spiritual values.

On Thursday 29th, I reached the great interdenominational holiness Camp-meeting at Richland, N. Y., which I attended more than twenty-five years ago, and which has been running with increasing power for about a third of a century.
