OBITUARY

William S. Beals

The death of William S. Beals occurred at his home in Collina, Kings county, on Friday, March 15, after an illness of ten days of pneumonia. Mr. Beals was 86 years of age and one of a large family of the late Rev. William Beals, a Methodist minister. He spent his childhood with his grandparents, Dr. and Mrs. Wilson, of Collina. He married Miss Annie Freeze, of Belleisle Creek, who was the mother of three, one son and two daughters. His first wife died about 40 years ago. Mr. Beals then married Miss Jane Long, of Collina, who survives him. His daughters are Mrs. William Josslyn, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Harry Fullerton, of Moncton. His son, Sherman B. passed away some years ago. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Joseph Hornbrook, of Sussex; Mrs. Dunlap, of Saint John, and Mrs. Chapman, in the United States. One grandchild, Mrs. Daniel Major, of Boston, also survives.

Mr. Beals was a member of the old militia of New Brunswick, having received medals for service in Fenian raids. Mr. Beals has been a justice of the peace for many years.

The funeral took place from his late residence on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. R. W. Hopkins of Lower Millstream, officiated. After Scripture reading and prayer and the singing of "There's a Land That is Fairer Than Day". The funeral cortege proceeded to Belleisle Creek church where service was held, attended by a large number. Rev. R. W. Hopkins spoke and hymns rendered were, "We Are Going Down The Valley One by One", "Meet Me There", Shall We Gather at The River" and "Will The Circle Be Unbroken".

Henry Delong

Henry Delong died at his home, Chapel St., Woodstock, N. B., on March 1st, 1929, being in his 71st year. He had been in failing health for a number of years, and at times a great sufferer, but the end came very sudden and unexpectedly.

The choir of this church also sang very appropriate hymns, which were very much appreciated. Interment was made at Oak Mountain cemetery, of which place he had lived when a young man.
