Sister Lester read the 4th of Nehemiah, giving a grand talk showing us our privilege of having a part in the building up and of a share in the work.

Sister A. C. Willey gave the address of welcome and truly she made us feel at home.

The address was responded to by B. M. Colpitts. After singing and reading of the minutes, Rev. H. S. Dow gave an address on the Sunday School work and read a clipping of a Judge of eighteen years of work, and had had 4,000 criminals before him, and of this lot only 13 had been attendants of the Sunday School. This speaks volumes. Several of the superintendents took part in speaking of the work.
