WORDS SPOKEN BY ANGELS

We have all seen numbers of pictures representing angels, drawn from the artist's own imagination. We have read splendid poems about angels-like Milton's "Paradise Lost." We often sing hymns dealing with the same subject; and some of the hymns are as fantastic as most of the pictures and the poetry. One result is that our ideas in regard to these spiritual beings are mixed up with a good many pious fancies and legends which do not properly belong to the Bible at all. It is true, indeed, that we find many references to angels in Scripture. Our Lord Himself speaks of them again and again, and recognizes them as realities-not beautiful dreams or mere figures of speech. The name angel originally meant "messenger," and in Scripture it generally stands for some heavenly visitant whereby God spoke or worked or made himself known on earth. We are told very little about the nature of the holy angels. They stand in the presence of God; they sing His pure praises in heaven; and sometimes He has used them as His special agents or instruments or messengers, by whose means He might come into closer touch with men. The Bible speaks of angels appearing in various forms. The angel who was seen sitting in Christ's empty sepulchre is described as "a young man clothed in a long white garment." Concerning the angel who rolled away the stone from the sepulchre, we read that "his countenance was like lightning and his raiment white as snow." Generally, however, we are not told that when angels brought some communication from God, their voices were like thunder. It seems rather as if the tones in which an angel uttered his words were not stormy or terrible, but soft and clear and gentle; and that often he spake with a still small voice. Many of the Jews believed that the Sacred Law which Moses received on Mount Sinai had been given to him by angels. At any rate, the Bible records not a few special messages which some angel of God spoke in ancient days .----Gleanings.
