Isaya says, "When I have trials and troubles it seems my heart is drawn out more than ever to preach the gospel and my joy increases in the Lord." Another time he said, "The Lord has sent me this little son, and if He sees fit to take him from me I say amen to the will of God. I shall see him again on the resurrection day. My heart is not on the things on earth; my treasure is in heaven, anyway."

Beloved, if you knew how much the natives' hearts are set on their children you would marvel at the resignation which Isaya and wife both show. Perhaps the Lord will yet spare this little fellow's life.

There were thirty present at class today, and such a sweet spirit, and the testimonies were so encouraging. Isaya preached today; his text was: "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." It was a message given in the spirit. He is a wonderful preacher. We give God the glory. Many heathen who six months ago were walking in heathen darkness, today are testifying with shining faces.

Just before Christmas a young married woman came here one Sunday from a beer drink, and by her talk she had been drinking her share alright. She has been coming to the Sunday services and also to the Thursday services. Today our hearts were so rejoiced to hear her say that the Lord has completely delivered her from drinking beer. Her heathen husband won't allow her to take down her heathen head-dress, but praise the Lord He is working in her heart just the same. No man can stop the workings of the Holy Spirit. Yes, dear ones, the Lord is surely working in our midst.

Sunday I had a blessed time here in the meeting; about thirty were present. Alice went to Joeli's outpost, as he failed to come. One gave herself to the Lord. Isaya went to Emozare. Tomorrow we expect to have a meeting about eight miles away.

Our kraal visiting is also a blessing. The Lord has spared our horses' lives so far during the horse sickness season, for which we are so thankful. Continue to pray for us, dear ones. We need your prayers.

On Nov. 5th, 1928, at the Quarterly Meeting at Millville, District No. 1, organized a Sunday School Convention, with Norman Cochrane, of Marysville, president. B. M. Colpitts, Woodstock, secretary, and Revs. E. W. Lester, H. S. Mullen and Sister Mrs. Robert Barr, additional members of the Executive.

On March 8th, 1929, we held the first session of our Convention. As the president was not present, Rev. E. W. Lester occupied the chair pro tem.

The Secretary gave a short talk on Sunday Schools as they used to be.

Rev. H. S. Dow gave a fine address on the "Ideal Sunday School;" spoke of teachers going before their class unprepared and heaving a sigh of relief when the lesson was over. Truly lost time. It is appalling these days to find how little people know about the word of God. Bring the word to the scholars so they will grasp it. The above school should have a superintendent who is interested. Truly he has a wonderful opportunity of imparting knowledge and interesting both young and old.

The great need is capable teachers, who are Christians, and having the cause at heart and able to pray and do so before going before their classes.

Be careful who you appoint for officers and teachers. Much harm may be done by getting the wrong officers.

The chairman said: If every one was in their place and had the cause at heart things would move along and we would have great success.

The visiting superintendents were called on for short reports and suggestions. Brother Wayman Wright from Southampton spoke: "Christ's Church," and what we should be to belong to this church. This is a wonderful work.

Brother William Rideout, of Hartland, thanked the Lord for the Sunday School and its influence for good on his life. In our school we try to instil the principles of the word in the young.

Brother Harry Clowes, of Woodstock said there were lots of things which tend to discourage the teacher, but do not get discouraged. There is one great remedy for discouragement and that is prayer.

The bye laws and Constitution as used by the Grand Manan and Washington County Convention with the exception of a few minor changes and the name, was adopted. After some discussion the name at the head of this report was adopted.

A real profitable time was spent in the talks and discussion, also in the reports given verbally.

We think these conventions will be a source of good and encouragement to many who do not get to a convention very often.
