THIRTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY REFORMED BAPTIST CHURCH, BEALS, MAINE

On November 9th, 1930, the thirty-eighth anniversary of the organization of the Reformed Baptist Church was observed with appropriate services. The pastor, Rev. H. C. Archer preached from Deut. 8:2; Mrs. H. V. Beal sang a solo.

Vinton V. Beal the clerk of the church read the following historical sketch of the church:

In the year 1895 Rev. Daniel Hilyard a local preacher came to Beals and began holding services in the school building. His labors were blessed of God, a number of persons finding Christ as their Savior. On November 6th, 1895 the Reformed Baptist Church was organized with thirteen members.

Ministers present and taking part in the service were :Revs. D. Hilyard, Z. B. Grass, T. W. Moses. The following year on October 14th, the first sod was turned in preparation for building a house of worship. The building was completed and on Feb. 6th, 1897 was dedicated to the worship of God.

The day was fine and a large congregation attended the dedicatory service. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Z. B. Grass, his text was Titus 3:8. Rev. D. Hilyard offered the dedicatory prayer. The pastor reported that the building had cost \$1600 and that there was a debt of \$700, yet to be paid. He called for subscription and John A. Beal was the first to respond with \$100. others followed with their subscriptions, and soon the whole amount was pledged.

Rev. Daniel Hilyard was the first pastor, others who followed him were Revs. W. H. Sherwood, A. T. Bubar, H. H. Cosman, C. S. Hilyard. T. W. Moses, T. J. Alley, H. C. Mullen, F. A. Watson and H. C. Archer who is the present pas-

In 1905 Bros. Eli Beal and John E. Beal presented the church with a lot of land for a parsonage, which was soon erected and which now provides a comfortable home for the pastor's family.

In 1919 the church was remodled and a vestry added at a cost of several thousand dollars. Previous to this Mr. and Mrs C. H. Beal presented the church with a fine bell, as well as a Delco lighting plant for the church and parsonage.

A tower clock was also placed in the steeple at this time, the gift of F. W. Beal and family This clock can be seen and heard far and near, and is a great convenience to the people of the town. Bro. Beal also placed a piano in the church at this time. A new set of window shades was also presented to the church, the gift of Bro. Eli Beal. An eight day wall clock was presented to the church by Bro. J. P. Alley and John E. Beal.

In 1924 the work of blasting the rock under the church was undertaken and although this was a very difficult task yet it proved successful. This work cost \$489.00; \$201.00 being paid by the "Ladies' Aid Society". Three brothers, Alonzo Alley, Avery and Esten Beal, each gave \$25. The balance which was \$213.00 was paid by C. H. Beal who in addition to this presented the church with a pipeless furnace costing \$248.00. Mrs. C. H. Beal presented the church with a carpet for the platform. The church has three beautiful memorial windows. A large one in the front, in memory of Rev. Daniel Hilyard, presented by the 'Ladies' Aid Society", who also

placed one in memory of their deceased members. A third memorial window was placed in the church by F. W. Beal and family, in memory of their daughter and sister, Miss Lucy J. Beal.

During the year 1929 this family presented the church with a beautiful pipe organ. This organ is also a memorial. The installation of the organ made necessary some changes in the church building. Mr. and Mrs. C .H. Beal added an alcove for that purpose, also placing a beautiful rose window at the back of the church. They also added new electric lights with dome shades. and in addition to this repainted the church and

During the past year a beautiful picture, "Christ on the Mount" was presented by the State Board of Assessors. In addition to the above improvement to the church, colored glass has also been placed in the windows, a hymn board on the wall, as well as rubber carpet for the aisles, and folding chairs for the choir.

Today as we stand and look back over the years that are past, we feel very thankful to our Heavenly Father for his blessing upon us, and although we have not accomplished all that we desired, yet we are sure that God has used this church to bring a blessing to the people of this community. The blessings received in the past give us courage and determination to be true and press the battle for God and Holiness in the days to come.
