

I am enclosing a short write-up of Pres. Neases' death which I feel might be appreciated in case it does not conflict with anything else you have put in the Highway.

His death was a great shock to us, and not only the school suffers but everyone connected with it and its students, will be effected in some degree. E. N. C. is not only the Nazerene's College but also our college. We Reformed Baptists have a share in it and it belongs to us, and so what is the college's loss is our loss.

I wished a few of our folks could have gotten out to the funeral but I also realized the difficulties.

I'm glad I can report victory in my soul. The blood cleanses up-to-date and I am endeavoring with the help of the Lord to perfect holiness in my life. and to bend every effort of body, soul, and mind to the promotion of His cause.

It may be that our president will be as great in his death as in his life, for he was God's man; and who would question when God saw fit to use him in death instead of in life? We are assured that God's hand is in his death and that our sorrows and problems are God's concern too, and He will see us through.

President Nease lived just long enough to see the turn of the tide for E. N. C. He was privileged to confer the A. B. degree upon but one graduating class. He saw the completion of the New Fowler Memorial building, helped dedicate it to the Lord, and occupied the new president's chair but a few times. God planned his death as He had his life and while we sorrow, it is not as those who have no hope but as knowing that "He doeth all things well."

A few words of Professor Angell at the funeral service were very fitting. He said that some men can be called gentlemen and some can be called Christians; but our president was one who could be called a Christian gentleman in the highest meaning of the term .

President Nease died as he had lived. On the way to the hospital he said, "This may mean the New Jerusalem for me." And again just before the operation he said to the doctor, "If anything happens, tell them I am ready." Almost his last words were, "Be sure to tell them everything is alright. I am satisfied." What a comfort those dying words are to sorrowing loved ones.

The funeral service was held on Thursday afternoon, October 30th, at the College. Hundreds of people were in attendance and floral tributes came from all sections of the United States, showing that the high regard in which President Nease was held by those immediately connected with him at the College was shared by people from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast.

Truly a great man has left us; but God grant that his memory shall ever remain fresh to inspire us to greater achievements in the service of the Lord.

## DEATH OF F. W. NEASE, PRESIDENT OF EASTERN NAZARENE COLLEGE

It is fitting that our Highway readers should know what great loss has been caused by the death of F. W. Nease, President of Eastern Nazarene College, which occurred October 26, 1930. We cannot understand why a man of such noble qualities and outstanding possibilities should be taken in the very prime of life. It is difficult for the faculty to realize that their leader is gone—the one with whom they labored so willingly-and that his burdens and responsibilities have been shifted to other shoulders. It is hard for us students to know that our president, our instructor, our counselor, our friend, will mingle with us no more. But his death has indelibly carved into our innermost selves, determinations to establish an institution and a work here that will be a fitting memorial to his character and ideals. His death is a challenge to us to live lives dedicated to the service of the Lord,

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spirtual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day."—Eph. 6:12-13.

"The prayer-warrior," says Rev. Gordon Watt in "The Strategic Value of Prayer," is not to accept any fatalistic position that, because evils are prophetically revealed as certain, it is therefore needless to oppose them. That would be to allow the prince of evil to have his way. Rather is it to remember the meaning of Calvary, and to translate it into the most determined action on the battlefield.
